Google representatives have expressed concerns regarding the **amount and source of General Plan program level environmental clearance (known as "development capacity")** needed to accommodate the cumulative impact of Google's Downtown West project, other development in the DSAP, and other Downtown development projects.

Concern has also been expressed about the **proportion of that development capacity** that the Downtown West project would need.

- There is adequate development capacity in the Downtown Growth Area to accommodate the Downtown West project with the shift of growth capacity analyzed in the Downtown West EIR.
- Major office projects within downtown, such as 200 Park Avenue, Adobe, Platform 16 and City View Plaza, are already accommodated with the development capacities in the Downtown Strategy 2040 EIR.
- Additional General Plan capacity shifts are needed to accommodate the anticipated amount
  of additional development in the DSAP, in addition to Downtown West. These are being
  evaluated by staff and will be analyzed in the environmental review of the General Plan
  amendments for the Downtown West project and the DSAP amendments, as well as the General
  Plan 4-Year Review process.
