Hi Nanci,

The following was included in the Department's memo recommending Fire Station placement priorities:

Diridon Station Area (Priority 7)

Diridon Station Project is forecasted to serve a growing population base and reduce second-due requirements for Station 1, 4, 7 and 30 which accounted for 14%, or more than 5,365 responses citywide in 2018 that were beyond the 4-minute travel time target. Increased service demand and altered area road access in this area will require an additional fire station.

With capacity scenarios more clearly defined, the Department can better estimate increased service demands. The DSAP boundary area overlays portions of Station 1, Station 7, and Station 30 response areas. In calendar year 2018, Station 7's response area had 1,194 late responses (>4 minute travel time), Station 1 had 1,111 late responses, and Station 30 978 late responses. These totaled 3,283 or approximately 8.66% of late responses citywide. Additional service demands in the DSAP will impact performance in these three response areas and surrounding station areas. Any roadway changes will also be impactful and may require adjustments to response area boundaries.

The current average persons per household in San Jose is 3.14 across 321,835 households (2014-2018 US Census Data). In FY 2018-19, the Department responded to 91,900 emergency incidents (City Auditor Annual Report of City Services); this is approximately .29 per household (including incidents outside of households). Based upon the 2018-2019 per household average, the Department's initial estimate for <u>annual</u> incident volume increases is as follows:

Based upon this initial analysis, the Department expects significant emergency incident response demands in the DSAP and surrounding transportation routes.

#### Resident Demographics

DSAP resident demographics will drive incident volume impacts and may. For example, high density housing developments in North San Jose (Fire Station 29's response area) initially had modest call volume impact. Over time however as demographics changed (and additional units added) including increases in numbers of elderly and youth, incident volume has steadily increased.

### Diridon Station Area Transportation Impacts

Based upon discussions with Bay Area cities with BART service, the Department expects significant impacts at BART stops and particularly high impacts at "end of line" stops. As a result, the Department anticipates that impacts will be driven upward. Increased ridership and automobile transportation to and from Mineta San Jose International Airport (SJC) and other high tech hubs will drive local business day population upward.

### Possible Actions to Absorb Increased Incident Volumes

- 1. Fire Station 20: The Department has recommended expansion of Fire Station 20 (at SJC) to include a landside bay which will enable service off of the secured airfield. This will support responses to the north end of the DSAP and will fortify Downtown resource
- 2. <u>Truck Company</u>: The Department has not yet restored resources lost in recession years. The elimination of Truck 3 (Third St. @ Martha St.) resulted in the relocation of Truck 4 (Leigh Ave near San Jose City College) to Station 30 on Auzerais Ave. This reduction has reduced Truck Company availability to high density housing buildings in West San Jose and South Downtown areas. The restoration of a Truck Company continues to be a high priority for the Department and the need is exacerbated by the DSAP.
- 3. Hazardous Incident Team (HIT): To meet recession reduction targets the Department eliminated HIT staffing, transitioning to a cross-staffed model whereby Truck 29 personnel staff the HIT. Anticipated population generated from the DSAP will require increased availability of the HIT to meet domestic terrorism response responsibilities and increased Truck Company availability demands.
- 4. <u>Additional Fire Station</u>: As stated above, the DSAP is the Department's 7<sup>th</sup> priority for new station placement based upon expected incident volume increases.
- 5. <u>Alternate Service Delivery Options</u>: While not currently in place, the Department continues to pursue alternate emergency medical services (EMS) options, especially for lower level emergency calls. While not an offset to items 1-4 above, alternate service options could enhance overall system performance at a low cost.

This is initial analysis based upon recent per household emergency response demands. Findings and recommendations may need to be amended as development plans are firmed.
