Jody – Here's what the Planners just sent me. It looks like we're not able to do an apples-to-apples comparison; to do that would require more specificity in the proposal:

Hi Cheryl, please see below for parking information:

- Old parking rules from 2000 Attached PDF is the Zoning Ordinance section for parking from 2000. For an analysis under the old rules, we need more than number of units. The rules consider the number of bedrooms in the units AND the type of parking to be provided (open, garages, etc.). The old rules also did not codify parking reductions.
- Current parking rules Table below is what we provided to Google in our 30 Day letter regarding parking information. See also this current zoning ordinance link:

Based on the current project scale and current municipal code requirements, the following is a <u>baseline</u> of the required number of

parking spaces based on the proposed land uses. Pending outcomes of transportation studies currently underway, these parking requirements may be modified for the Diridon Station Area.

<u>Land Use</u>	<u>Proposed</u>	Base Requirement (Downtown Zoning)	Bicycle Parking Requirements
Residential	3,000 – 5,900 SF	1 space/unit	1 per 4 living units
Office/R&D	6,500,000 - 7,300,000 SF	2.5 spaces/1,000 floor area	1 per 4,000 SF of floor area
Hotel	Up to 300 Rooms	0.35 spaces/key	1 space plus 1 per 10 guest rooms
